Allestree Park update

Quarndon Swift Group

Spotting elusive airborne swifts is much easier now, following the arrival of juveniles that migrate to the UK from late May (and some warmer drier weather).



Watch out over Quarndon for their scythe-shaped wings,

dark bodies and short forked tails. They can be seen any time of day but the hours before dusk is when they come lower in the sky. They're incredibly acrobatic in flight, swerving, diving and wheeling to catch tiny insects, and often screaming loudly; the "Supermarine Spitfire" of the bird world!

The juveniles are here to explore potential nest sites for next year or 2026. So, those with nest boxes should ensure the swift callers are on, helping the birds find the 40 or so boxes around the village.

<u>TIP:</u> If the birds you see are perching, have any white areas, or long tails, then they're not swifts - more likely they will be the smaller, house martins or swallows.

If you can't see them, consider joining the free, professionally-led swift walk between 7:30pm and 9pm on 5 July in Duffield - organised by Duffield Save Our Swifts; for details click here and to book email sosduffield@gmail.com or ipfarnsworth4@gmail.com.

Duffield has a good number of swift colonies in the roads around Avenue Road/Vicarage Lane and New Zealand Lane. Belper, which started its own swift preservation club this year, also has strong colonies near the marketplace.

St. Paul's Church Clock

The clock installation dates from Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. It began to chime in Nov 1897. In 2004, it was upgraded to use the time signal transmitted by GPS satellites to give precise accuracy.

However, the chiming stopped over three years ago when it became apparent that the clock needed a major overhaul. Since then a great amount of time and energy have been dedicated by the Church Warden, Mike Annable, to getting one of Quarndon's most familiar sights and sounds going again.

The major repair of this old clock was completed earlier in the year at which point it was realised that a permanent platform was needed in the clock tower to comply with safety regulations before the clock could be reinstalled. Once this platform was completed, the clock was fitted back in place. Then yet another problem arose to delay the return of the chimes... It was discovered that the clock face was showing significant damage and needed repair. So, that is the current works in waiting.

The costs have been mounting over these two years, but the Church is determined to have its clock going later on in 2024.

Giant Hogweed Returns to Quarndon

Giant Hogweed has been found on Footpath 11, the highest path leading off Church Road. Though attractive to look at, this is not a plant to go near and certainly not touch as its sap can cause burns.

Giant hogweed contains *furocoumarin*, an organic chemical compound that makes skin extremely sensitive to sunlight. Sap on the skin plus sunlight can lead to painful and long-lasting burns. The landowners are in the process of dealing with this unwelcome visitor. Meanwhile please give it a wide berth and ensure that your pets do likewise.

20's Plenty where people live - So why are our speed limits still 30mph?

Discussion piece by Keith Thomas:

The Quarndon Parish Council along with almost 100 other parish and local councils throughout Derbyshire has for several years been advocating 20mph speed limits 'where people live', i.e. where the speed limits are currently 30mph. This advocacy included meeting with Barry Lewis, leader of Derbyshire County Council (DCC) which is responsible for our roads, back in 2022, to make the case.

Unfortunately, DCC are strongly opposed to 'signed only' 20mph speed limits, claiming that they are ineffective in reducing road casualties and have no other community benefits. The current DCC leadership was elected in 2021 on a manifesto that promised 'Greener Town' trials including 20mph zones in two Derbyshire



towns. Long Eaton and Buxton were eventually selected for these trials but then, at the height of the controversy caused by blanket replacement of 30mph speed limits with 20mph across Wales in September 2023, DCC 'consulted' on these trials with the following results:

- In Buxton 205 responses were received, with 104 in favour and 100 against and one blank
- In Long Eaton 306 responses were received, with 63 in favour and 184 against, 59 were blank

DCC used this as 'evidence' to cancel the trials in both towns, despite less than 1% of the combined population (2021 Census) of the two towns having responded to the consultation.

Prime minister Rishi Sunak even jumped on the bandwagon attacking the Welsh implementation of 20mph speed limits saying he wanted to stop "hare-brained" road calming and safety schemes, including 20mph zones, to end what he said is a "war on motorists".

Now the facts. The much-maligned Welsh implementation was on 17 Sept 2023. The road accident casualty data for Quarter 4 (Q4) 2023 has recently been published on the *StatsWales* website.

The table (left) compares casualties on all roads in Wales, with speed limits of 30mph or less in:

- 2022 Q4, which was before the 20mph speed limits were widely implemented
- 2023 Q4, the first full quarter since implementation.

The bottom line is a reduction in total Q4 casualties of 218 or 32%.

Note that because (almost) all roads in Wales that previously had 30mph speed limits have changed to 20mph limits, it is not unexpected

that casualties on roads with 20mph limits have gone up – there are now far more roads with 20mph limits. The important point is that total casualties across all roads with speed limits of 30mph or less has gone down significantly.

Scotland is rolling out 20mph speed limits where people live using a progressive approach, which plans to complete by the end of 2025.
