From our Local Councillors:

The Future of Belper's Historic Mills

Belper's Mills, part of the Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site, has been a symbol of our local history for centuries. As one of the oldest cotton mills in the world, it remains an important landmark in our area. However, its future is now uncertain, and many are asking—what's next?

A recent UNESCO report raised concerns about the future of the site. The report warns that pressures from new developments and poor conservation could put the mill's World Heritage status at risk. Some key issues include not properly looking after important buildings, unsuitable developments nearby, and a shortage of funds to properly preserve these historic sites. Belper's North Mill and East Mill are particularly at risk due to neglect and decay.

Your Green councillors are passionate about protecting Belper's mills and the entire heritage site. After the UNESCO report was published, Duffield Green councillors, Alison McDermott and Eva Long, along with Belper Green

Councillors, met with the council's conservation officer and the Head of Planning to review the findings and discuss next steps.

They also connected with a local historian and a community group dedicated to saving the mills. With Eva's experience as a conservation officer and Alison's background as an architect, the councillors are working hard to understand and tackle the challenges facing the mill.


St Paul's Church – Clock and Heating

The Brailsford Ploughing Match

Following several days of rain, the Brailsford Ploughing Match took place on Wednesday 2 October 2024 at Middleton Park Farm, Alkmonton under grey skies that thankfully didn't produce any further rain and gradually cleared to grant us some afternoon sunshine.

The fields were not too muddy and soon a patchwork of immaculate furrows was produced by the tractor drivers on their machines ancient and modern. The solitary horse drawn plough also seemed to cope well with the heavy but not unduly sticky ground. Usually there are several horse entries but perhaps most had been put off this year by the days of rain preceding the match.

Quarndon Community Speedwatch

During the first three weeks of October 2024 the Quarndon Community Speedwatch (CSW) team was somewhat less active than during September, largely because of planned sessions being cancelled due to rain, of which we have had plenty.

The results for October to date as we 'go to press' with this newsletter are: twelve drivers will get 'first' letters from the police; three will get second letters; and one driver will get an educational visit from the police. Only one of these drivers was local.

The aim of Speedwatch is to provide a visible presence, supported by the police, to encourage safe driving speeds.



As a result of the significant numbers of speeding vehicles recorded in Quarndon by the CSW teams, the police have recently reviewed the sites within Quarndon that they will use for visits by their enforcement teams.
